Welcome to Bedford. This amazing market town full of nature. We love it here and so will you.

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
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SOME QUESTIONS TO ASK YOURSELF

THE SIGHTS OF BEDFORD

THESE ARE THE FAMOUS SIGHTS OF BEDFORD

Bedford Corn Exchange

Bedford Corn Exchange was built in 1785 or 12 February 1962. When it was first built it was for farmers to exchange things like corn. Now it is for concerts and theatre where you can watch actors. The music here is nice. It is a haunted building to explore. We think that there are lots of spiders there. It is good but old. Some of us have performed inside.

The Green Bunkers

These are military hangars from the 1930s which were created for making guns and airships in WWII. Now they are a studio where they make films and tv shows like Batman, James Bond and Dumbo. They are really big and we respect them. There was once a spaceship which landed there.



The Snowman

We made this snowman monument for our friend who likes snowmen in winter. She likes making them and naming them and some sometimes puts a wig on it and we laugh.

Pyramid Pool

Oasis Swimming Pool was built in 2005 and looks like a pyramid from Egypt. There's a giant swimming pool inside and we really like it, but it is really expensive. It was made for swimming and swimming lessons and water slides. Lots of people swim here because it is a popular place. It is for all ages.

The Moon

This is a statue for our mums because we think they deserve to be celebrated for all the hard work they've done for us and our siblings to enjoy our lives. We made it in the shape of a moon because they love us to the moon and back.





Boba Tea

This is a monument to Boba Tea because our friend really likes Boba and we always drink it together. She really likes the flavour peach with blueberry. We made a little face and added a straw to make it more detailed.

Flowers

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By King's Oak Primary School there is a park and in the park there are flowerbeds and if you look carefully at these flowerbeds you might see some flowers from the seeds we planted for this guidebook. We did this to make the streets prettier.

The Blue Man in a Cape

This is a statue of John Bunyan, or it might be a soldier from 1964, or a king, or a prime minister. It might be his grave. It was created for respect and honour and to represent the time John Bunyan was in jail for illegally preaching.



Baby Yoda

This sculpture of Baby Yoda near Primark was built for our Dad who we only see twice every two weeks. We built it near Primark because Primark has lots of Star Wars things.



Football Pitch

This is a monument in the shape of a football pitch and a ball. It was built for our brothers who play football and inspired us to play as well. They play at the back so we play at the back.

Castle Mound

The Castle Mound is a part of a castle that was abandoned. It was made in the Roman time or in 1066, and was built for King Edward.

The mound is big and beautiful and from here you can see the view of the river. It's good for taking photos. It's very steep and hard to climb.

River Great Ouse

The River Great Ouse was built in the early years of Bedford and now is home to swans and the Swan Hotel. Football Trophy

Heart

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This statue of a heart represents our lovely teachers because they help us a lot.

The Higgins Museum

Two Moon Faces

THE ORDINARY STREETS OF BEDFORD

All across Bedford you will find ordinary streets like the streets near our schools where we live.


Our streets are full of nature and birds. There's a big tree and a play area and lots of grass to do gymnastics. There are two parks nearby and we can ride our scooters there. There's a neighbourhood garden and just down the road is an allotment which is always calm and peaceful. Our friends are always playing football and we can join in. We ride our bikes every day on the small path. We love all the sneaky animals that come at day and night. There are birds, squirrels, pigeons, spiders, hedgehogs, magpies, robins, newts, baby frogs, foxes and even deer. Our neighbour has a pet snake. There's a three-legged ginger cat, a cat with a cut-off tail, a pug called Hugo and a mouse that died due to the Coronavirus. Once

we saw 4 or 5 squirrels in a big bin. Sometimes there are foxes looking for food and sometimes we put food out for the foxes and the foxes go in circles around us and it is the best thing we ever felt.

Some of our streets are next to a forest and some of them are next to shops like Nisa Local and nice cafes and restaurants and a bakery. We have all the facilities that a citizen should have like a bus station, Lidl and Tesco. There's a shop on our street and the man in the shop gives us free candy nearly every day. We like it when the streets are calm. We like how quiet it can be when no cars are driving by. There are trampolines in the back yards. There are lots of different religions and they all have fireworks on different days. Sometimes the sky is pink and blue and it is very beautiful.

Lots of people live on our streets and everyone is really nice (well nearly everyone). There's always people making drama (we love drama). There's May and Richard and Ian who has motorbikes and Joyce and Aunty Carly and Mad Ricky and Zayn who tells everyone's secrets and Kate who always has something different to do each day. There's Asma who gives us food and Mike who just turned 90. There's a professional wrestler and a man who taught us how to fish and someone's mum who's always shouting at her son. There's a neighbour who always stares at his car and a neighbour who has a beautiful tree that blooms flowers. There's the lady whose house always smells of perfume and the man who has a business fixing vacuums. There's the family that own our favourite pizza restaurant and the old lady who comes to our house every Sunday to play some board games. Our neighbours smile at us every day and we say hello to them. There's a lot of respect on our streets. People treating each other like they would like to be treated. When we knock on their doors at Halloween they give us colossal chunks of sweets.

On our streets there are often too many cars and people park them badly. We don't like it when the cars go rushing by and we don't like it when they don't stop for you on the zebra crossing. The houses don't look very cosy and they're too close together. It's not good to have a train track right next door and sometimes at night people play loud music, have fights and shout swear words. On Saturdays you can feel the vibrations from the bars and nightclubs and it's really so hard to sleep. We can smell when people are smoking nearby. Cats sick on our doorstep and poo in our back garden. People are always damaging doors. It can flood.



We need a bigger field and a park in the field. More bins for litter. Add more trees and more flowers. No more busy roads. Change the flats into houses and add a sweety shop around the corner. Get rid of the 'no ball games' sign. We want more kids our age to play with. We want to have a swimming pool in our street every summer. We want people to invite us to their Halloween and Christmas parties. We want space to ourselves.

But really we love our streets.

We love the street parties and the bonfires. Our neighbours celebrating Pakistani
Independence Day and our aunty's wedding party with the loud drums. Every new year we have a street party and we dance and celebrate together and it makes us really happy to spend time with our neighbours. The streets are lit up by fireworks.

We remember when a tree got hit by lightning and the power cuts and when we saw a lady filling her car with trays of cakes and biscuits as if she was getting ready for a massive party. Once we saw three birds fighting over an apple and once a swan knocked on the kitchen window asking for food. A rabbit escaped. A police car chased another car down the street. We remember when two grown men were fighting in the street at Christmas for 10 whole minutes until the police finally came and when the fire alarm went off and everyone went outside and we got a picture with a fireman. We remember seeing a wild deer and when there were four foxes all running around. We remember the Northern Lights and when someone had a heart attack. We remember the fire in Tyne Crescent and the explosion on Cleat Hill. We remember when our street was at the end of a rainbow.





On our streets there are lots of things you might not see unless you look very closely. Things like little dust particles, bacteria, and phone calls. Lavender and radio signals. Conkers, plastic bottles, rubbish, unraked leaves. There are satellite dishes, two caterpillars, a cat under a car, a colony of ants, a 20p coin stuffed in a bottle cap, birds on the rooves, tiny black dots on a house. Maybe there is a rabbit. Maybe someone is looking out of a window. There are aeroplanes in the sky, drones, footprints, music. Spiderwebs, moss, still water, rain.

These are the streets where we live, and everyone we know is very close by.

THE NEW STREET OF BEDFORD

The best thing about Bedford is the new street that we designed ourselves.

There are more flowers on this street and no bumps in the road. It has brighter streetlamps and a bike lane and a silent leaf vacuum to clear the paths and stop leaves getting in our shoes. There's a robot to stop smoking and litter, and a robot to water plants, and a speed bot with cameras for eyes who says "thank you" if you are driving below the speed limit. There are mountains and lakes for hiking and a bench so if you go on a bike ride or a hike or most importantly if you're elderly you can rest. At certain times like Christmas we put decorations up all along the street.

On our new street we built an open-air cinema and a snake pet shop and a 17-million-megapixel simulator room. There's a halal burger stop, a Nutella shop and a pasta drive-through (because who



doesn't love pasta?) where you can get rigatoni, bacon and cream cheese for £6.20. There's also a foodbank so people with no food can get food and a shop with a rainbow door where they have meal deals, sweets, toys, newspapers, birthday cards, magazines, cereal, snacks and electronics. There's a fun club where people can play and an escape room made by the one and only Elfredo (he is Spanish and he has a creepy laugh). Outside the escape room it says, 'Entra si te atreves'.

There's an animal hotel for stray cats, foxes and dogs and a swimming pool where people can learn to swim. There's a shelter where people can go if they're homeless or struggling with rent and a noodle and bubble tea shop. We also built a secret treehouse that is only for kids with a big slide and a ball pit. Drinks and snacks are free for everyone and the council restocks it every day. You can go there when you don't want people to bother you.

The park on our new street is better than the old basic and boring ones. It has an entranceway shaped like a heart and inside there ziplines,

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monkey bars, playing blocks, a spinney thing, a ship, trampolines, rock climbing, a chill out area, a car track with real small cars, a waterslide and a submarine. It has a slide with a robot hand to push you and an automatic swing with hard and soft modes. There's a massive field with short grass and different sports like football, basketball, cricket, badminton and running so people can play whenever they want without walking too far and a robot footballer so you always have someone to play with. There is also a skate park and a gym for parents to work out. There's a pond and green leaves and a first aid post in case you fall over.

We also built a weather machine to control the weather so you can go places every day and you don't need to wait for the rain to stop.



OUR SCHOOLS

One of the most important parts of Bedford are our schools.

Our schools are full of diverse people with different cultures. People like Mr Jarret, who plays the trumpet, and Mrs Zaman, who had an interesting childhood. There is Kingston who knows so much maths and Joseph who is the fastest in the whole school (including teachers) and our friend Mohsina who has the most interesting ideas. There's Mrs Allcorn who has 8 dogs and Mr Wiltsher who changes from happy to upset very slowly.

We love learning and working because you get smarter if you learn, but we also love break time because that is when we have fun chatting with our friends on the playground and doing backflips on the climbing area. The hardest things are staying focussed, the 6× tables and Spanish, which we are ok with but it is still learning a new

language. Also, as you get older, you have to live up to expectations.

We wish school would start in the afternoons so we don't have to get up in the morning and we wish we could get rid of our uncomfortable uniforms and wear our pyjamas instead. We wish we could get a school pet. We want to banish bullies and litter. We want to turn the playground into a swimming pool. But also, we might just change our schools to be rich and famous because really they are already perfect.



SOME INTERESTING WALKS

An Autumn Walk

As you leave my house you will smell the dandelions on the porch. The autumn trees fluttering in the breeze. The dogs being walked and the stray cats going for a stroll. The bees buzzing in the sky, taking some pollen to their hive. Then you cross the road. Be careful though, the road is very busy. Once you've crossed the road turn right. Then when you get to a gap move forward and there you'll see the park, a place where only happiness is. The smell of the grass is luscious, the daisies are cute and you can feel the metal as you open the gate.

A Great Feeling Walk

If you walk around my
neighbourhood you shouldn't
get tired, but you might. The
most beautiful place around my
neighbourhood is the wood. I don't
know what name it is, but this is
near where I live. It's really difficult
to walk where I live because it rains
a lot so there's a lot of puddles, so

get some wellies. You will be able to hear lots of shouting because there's a pub down my road which normally is pretty loud because of the very good football. If you were there you would smell farm animals and beer because of the pub. It would smell horrible, disgusting and kind of good sometimes if you are lucky. If you go on this walk you feel calm, happy and loving. You'll feel great!

An Emotional Walk

As you enter the flower forest, you can already smell all the colourful flowers. It will make you feel calm. As you continue walking, you will see a big, cute butterfly and it will make you feel emotional. Walking might make you tired so you should sit on the big wooden bench and relax. On your way home you will see some big trees.

A Sunset Walk

First, start in the Aldi car park on Church Lane. Then, go straight and turn right. Go straight and see the sunset. Go through the roundabout and see a big bus. Keep on going straight on Church Lane. Bedford is a peaceful place to live with lots of nature. It's a very safe place (not like America where they have lots of guns). There are free libraries and free schools and lots of shops. It's awesome. Sometimes there's a lot of poverty which you can see in the town centre, but it's good when your family are nearby and lots of stuff happens here, like the River Festival. We give it 5/10 (but it'd be more if there was a McDonald's playpark).

We worry that all the animals will be extinct and trees will be cut down and robots will take over. We worry that too much tech will make everyone in the future very lazy. We worry that there'll be no people left just AI. We worry our schools might get shut down.

Maybe technology will take over or maybe everything will just be upgraded. Maybe AI will be the new king and it'll open new shops and be everywhere. We're looking forward to new technologies. We're looking forward to the PlayStation 6 and getting social media accounts. We're looking forward to learning new languages. We're looking forward to going to upper school and then college and then university and then saving up some money and buying a house and all the food we need. We're looking forward to being artists and nail technicians and famous footballers with their own cards on FC Mobile. More than anything we're looking forward to Universal Studios.

We might not all still be in Bedford in the future. We might be in Madrid or Barcelona playing football or in Poland with our families. We might be in Egypt or Jamaica or working at Addenbrooke's in Cambridge. Or we might be who knows where. Some of us will still be here because Bedford is where our memories are.

Wherever we are remember us and remember what we showed you. This is a memento from a moment in time. This is what it was like to live in Bedford in 2025.

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
